


VII. Circuit Through Perea Toward Jerusalem



At that time some Pharisees said to him, "Get away from here if you want to live! Herod Antipas wants to kill you!"




VII. Circuit Through Perea Toward Jerusalem




Hearing this, a man sitting at the table with Jesus exclaimed, "What a blessing it will be to attend a banquet in the Kingdom of God!"

Jesus replied with this story:







"Or what king would go to war against another king without first sitting down with his counselors to discuss whether his army of 10,000 could defeat the 20,000 soldiers marching against him? And if he can't, he will send a delegation to discuss terms of peace while the enemy is still far away. So you cannot become my disciple without giving up everything you own.


Salt is good for seasoning. But if it loses its flavor, how do you make it salty again? Flavorless salt is good neither for the soil nor for the manure pile. It is thrown away. Anyone with ears to hear should listen and understand!"

Tax collectors and other notorious sinners often came to listen to Jesus teach. This made the Pharisees and teachers of religious law complain that he was associating with such sinful people—even eating with them!




#### Lost Sheep

So Jesus told them this story: "If a man has a hundred sheep and one of them gets lost, what will he do? 


#### Prodigal Son

"A man had two sons. The younger son told his father, 'I want my share of your estate now before you die.' So, his father agreed to divide his wealth between his sons.



"When he finally came to his senses, he said to himself,








#### Shrewd Steward






"No one can serve two masters. For you will hate one and love the other; you will be devoted to one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and be enslaved to money."

Then he said to them, "You like to appear righteous in public, but God knows your hearts. What this world honors is detestable in the sight of God.



"For example, a man who divorces his wife and marries someone else commits adultery. And anyone who marries a woman divorced from her husband commits adultery."



"But Abraham said, 'Moses and the prophets have warned them. Your brothers can read what they wrote.'


"The rich man replied, 'No, Father Abraham! But if someone is sent to them from the dead, then they will repent of their sins and turn to God.'







So he told them plainly, "Lazarus is dead. And for your sakes, I'm glad I wasn't there, for now you will really believe. Come, let's go see him."


Thomas, nicknamed the Twin, said to his fellow disciples, "Let's go, too—and die with Jesus."

Jesus told her, "Your brother will rise again."


"Yes," Martha said, "he will rise when everyone else rises, at the last day."


When Jesus saw her weeping and saw the other people wailing with her, a deep anger welled up within him, and he was deeply troubled.

The people who were standing nearby said, "See how much he loved him!" But some said, "This man healed a blind man. Couldn't he have kept Lazarus from dying?"




Jesus was still angry as he arrived at the tomb, a cave with a stone rolled across its entrance. "Roll the stone aside," Jesus told them.

Many of the people who were with Mary believed in Jesus when they saw this happen. But some went to the Pharisees and told them what Jesus had done.







One day the Pharisees asked Jesus, "When will the Kingdom of God come?"



Jesus answered them with a question: "What did Moses say in the law about divorce?"


"Well, he permitted it," they replied. "He said a man can give his wife a written notice of divorce and send her away."

Jesus' disciples then said to him, "If this is the case, it is better not to marry!"





"Teacher," the man replied, "I've obeyed all these commandments since I was young."





The disciples were astounded. "Then who in the world can be saved?" they asked.


Jesus looked at them intently and said, "Humanly speaking, it is impossible. But not with God. Everything is possible with God. What is impossible for people is possible with God."



"They replied, 'Because no one hired us.'


"The landowner told them, 'Then go out and join the others in my vineyard.'


"So those who are last now will be first then, and those who are first will be last. For many are called, but few chosen."

Then the mother of James and John, the sons of Zebedee, came to Jesus with her sons. She knelt respectfully to ask a favor. "What is your request?" he asked.


She replied, "In your Kingdom, please let my two sons sit in places of honor next to you, one on your right and the other on your left."

They replied, "When you sit on your glorious throne, we want to sit in places of honor next to you, one on your right and the other on your left."






"Be quiet!" the people in front yelled at him.




When Jesus came by, he looked up at Zacchaeus and called him by name. "Zacchaeus!" he said. "Quick, come down! I must be a guest in your home today."

Jesus responded, "Salvation has come to this home today, for this man has shown himself to be a true son of Abraham. For the Son of Man came to seek and save those who are lost."






"Well done!' the king exclaimed. 'You are a good servant. You have been faithful with the little I entrusted to you, so you will be governor of ten cities as your reward.'




"Then, turning to the others standing nearby, the king ordered, 'Take the money from this servant, and give it to the one who has ten pounds.'


"But, master,' they said, 'he already has ten pounds!'


VII. Circuit Through Perea Toward Jerusalem

Six days before the Passover celebration began, Jesus arrived in Bethany, the home of Lazarus—the man he had raised from the dead.


Being in Bethany, Jesus visited the home of Simon, a man who had previously had leprosy.

Some of those at the table were indignant. "Why waste such expensive perfume?" they asked. So, they scolded her harshly.






